Home Voting

To arrange a pre-poll home visit, you can call the Reform Jersey helpline on 07829 725255. However, if you fall ill on Election Day itself, you can call the Town Hall on 01534 811811.

If you will be out of the Island during the election, but wish to vote by post, you can apply for a Postal Vote by filling out the application form which can be found at the Town Hall, or online at www.vote.je

If you require any assistance in obtaining or filling out any voting application form, please do not hesitate to contact Reform jersey and we will arrange for somebody to help you.


Register to vote

St. Helier

It is important that we continue to make St. Helier a better place to live, work and play. St. Helier is the Island's business and cultural hub. We need to support progressive planning policies that are sympathetic to the Parish's history and built heritage, but enable urban regeneration, encourage social hubs and protect green spaces.

Within the district, traffic and its associated pollution is a problem. We need to work collaboratively with the Parish, LibertyBus and environmental pressure groups to find innovative ways to encourage people out of their cars and to use busses, bikes or feet instead. A free Hoppa bus service should be introduced. This would not only reduce the traffic in town, but would also improve access to essential services for the elderly and people with disabilities.

Reform Jersey supports the introduction of a democratic local Council for St. Helier with enhanced powers to deliver services for residents, visitors and businesses in town.

We also believe that the current electoral system needs to be reformed. The current constituency boundaries mean that the people of St. Helier are disproportionately under-represented compared to the country Parishes. This is outdated and unfair and needs to change before the next general election.

Reform Jersey's sitting members have made progress in achieving the 10 key pledges from our manifesto last year. If I elected, I will join them in working to make these a reality.

I am committed to:

- Reforming our Income Tax system
 to allow all taxpayers to claim tax
 allowances, reducing the effective
 rate for all taxpayers, except the
 highest earning 5% who will be
 asked to pay slightly more.
- Amending the Public Finances Law to allow for meaningful negotiations with public sector workers for a cost of living pay increase.
- Maintaining grants to cover the costs of university tuition fees for all Jersey students, along with means tested maintenance grants. For those not seeking higher education, we shall secure provision of high quality vocational pathways.
- Increasing the Minimum Wage to £10 an hour by 2022 and end the inappropriate use of zero-hour contracts by enforcing the JACS guidelines through regulation.
- Reducing Social Security Contributions for the self-employed and gradually increase the rate for high earners, to match the rate paid by low and middle earners.
- Introducing 26 weeks statutory parental leave funded from Social Security contributions and 3 weeks' minimum statutory annual paid leave.
- Working with the Jersey Electricity Company to support investment in renewable energy technologies and set ambitious targets for renewable energy generation.

 overseeing the administration of grants programmes for the creative industries, and funding contracts with nongovernment organisations.
